



2022 EVALUATORS



Dr. Andrea E. Brown

Dr. Andrea E. Brown was appointed the Associate Director of Bands at the University of Maryland in 2018. In this position she conducts the University of Maryland Wind Ensemble and serves as the Director of Athletic Bands in which she leads the "Mighty Sound of Maryland" and all aspects of the athletic band program.

Brown is formerly a member of the conducting faculty at the University of Michigan where she served as the assistant director of bands. In this position, she was the conductor of the Campus Bands and director of the Campus Band Chamber Ensembles, associate director of the Michigan Marching and Athletic Bands, director of the Men's Basketball Band, guest conductor with the Symphony Band and Concert Band, taught conducting, and was a faculty sponsor of a College of Engineering Multidisciplinary Design Project team researching conducting pedagogy technology. Previously

Brown was the director of orchestra and assistant director of bands at the Georgia Institute of Technology in Atlanta where she also led research in conducting pedagogy technology and was a member of the Oxford Program faculty. She is a frequent guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator in the US, Europe, and Asia.

Brown completed a DMA in instrumental conducting at UNC Greensboro where she was a student of John Locke and Kevin Geraldi. While at UNCG, she was named Outstanding Teaching Assistant and was both guest conductor and principal horn on UNCG Wind Ensemble's fireworks! and finish line! CDs released on the Equilibrium label. Brown has also had several rehearsal guides published in the popular GIA Publications series, "Teaching Music Through Performance in Band" and has presented at the Midwest Clinic in Chicago, Music For All Summer Symposium, the Yamaha Bläserklasse in Schlitz, Germany, the International Computer Music Conference in Ljubljana, Slovenia, the College Music Society International Conference in Sydney, Australia, and multiple times at the College Band Directors National Association National Conference.



Walter A. Harley

Walter A. Harley was born and raised in Baltimore, Maryland and educated in the Baltimore City Public School System. His early training in music began in his parent's home, where he received his first drum set at five years old and started playing piano at the age of twelve.

Walter performed in his junior and senior high school bands in Baltimore. He was the first drummer for the group called "Baby Face" and was the drummer for the R&B group "Parliament."

Walter recorded many records with James Cleveland, Richard Smallwood, Parliament, and many others. He made television tapings with Alex Haley, Danny and Marie Osmond, and others.

He attended Livingstone College in Salisbury, NC, where he received a bachelor's degree in music education. While in college, he was the first student band director at Livingstone College, and Epcot All American Bandsman's and a member with the Salisbury Rowan Symphony Orchestra, in Salisbury, NC.

Later, he attended Morgan State University in Baltimore, Maryland as a graduate student in Percussion Performance and Music Education. There, he directed the Morgan State University Percussion Ensemble and was the principle timpanist for the Baltimore Wind Ensemble, under the baton of Dr. Kenneth Keeling. Several years later, he attended University of Maryland, College Park to study conducting with John E. Wakefield and wrote his thesis on the music of Percy Grainger. He studied percussion with Robert Rosen and Leo Page of the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra.

Walter has taught in North Carolina, Baltimore City Public Schools, and Mark of Excellent Christian Academy and is currently Chairman and Director of Bands and Orchestra at Oxon Hill High School in Prince Georges County, Maryland where he has been for the past twentyone years. His ensembles have received Superior and Excellent ratings at local, state, and national music festivals. Oxon Hill High School performed "A Salute to the 2008 Olympics" in Beijing, China.

He is a member of the: Music Educators National Conference, Maryland Music Educators Association, Maryland Band Directors Association, Texas Bandmasters Association, National Band Association State Chair, Phi Beta Mu International Bandmasters Fraternity, Minority Band Directors National Association. Phi Beta Sigma, Fraternity, Inc. and honorary member Kappa Kappa Psi, National Honorary Band Fraternity, Inc. He is a member of Healthy Choice Ministries in Baltimore, Maryland.

He has been awarded the Band Director of the Year 2008, LOVE Award 2009 and 2012, Prince Georges' County Teacher of the Year 2000, Prince Georges' County Outstanding Educator of the Year 2010, 2011, and 2012 also, The Washington Post Agnes Myer Outstanding Educator of the Year 2012, National Band Association Citation of Excellence (4 times).

Walter is married to Janis and they have three children: Sheryl Dias Landers (clarinet), Jéaclem Harley (double bass), Arreon Harley (vocalist), and five grandchildren. Sheryl was Walter's first chair clarinetist at Oxon Hill High School. Walter and Janis reside in Fort Washington, Maryland.





Colonel Timothy J. Holtan

Colonel Timothy J. Holtan retired in 2017 as the senior military musician in the Department of Defense. Col. Holtan's final command was as the 10th Leader and Commander of The United States Army Band "Pershing's Own." He holds the distinction of being the only officer to command all three of the Army's premier bands, which include the U.S. Army Field Band and the U.S. Military Academy Band at West Point. Col. Holtan received numerous military awards and honors during his 28½-year career, including the Army Distinguished Service Medal.

Col. Holtan is a graduate of Bismarck (ND) High School and is a former school music educator in Montana.

A clinician for Conn-Selmer, Inc. and Artistic Director of the newly formed professional wind band The Maryland Winds, he is a strong advocate for music education, enjoys substitute teaching, and is in demand as a guest conductor,

clinician and adjudicator. Col. Holtan has presented concerts and clinics in all 50 states, Canada, Japan, the U.S. Virgin Islands and across Europe.

In 2000, Col. Holtan was selected for the Army's "Training with Industry" program. He served as the Director of Operations and Associate Conductor of the Dallas Winds, while concurrently pursuing doctoral studies at the University of North Texas. Col. Holtan holds music education degrees from Montana State University and the University of Montana, and has pursued additional conducting studies with Elizabeth Green, H. Robert Reynolds, John Paynter, Larry Rachleff, Jerry Junkin and Eugene Corporon.

Col. Holtan's ensembles have been seen on many nationally televised broadcasts and diverse stages such as the Kennedy Center, Lincoln Center, DAR Constitution Hall, Mormon Tabernacle, Myerson Symphony Center, and Meyerhoff Symphony Hall, as well as for the 2017 Presidential Inaugural Concert at the Lincoln Memorial. Under his leadership and after a 44-year absence, the West Point Band reestablished a partnership with the New York Philharmonic, which resulted in five Lincoln Center joint concert performances. Col. Holtan also led the West Point Band in the Emmy-nominated "Marina at West Point" PBS television production that has reached over 180 million viewers.

Col. Holtan has been honored as Alumnus of the Year by Bismarck State College and was inducted into the Bismarck High School Hall of Fame. Col. Holtan served for twelve years on the National Band Association Board of Directors

and has received multiple Citations of Excellence. In 2011, he was the University of Montana's School of Visual and Performing Arts "Odyssey of the Stars" honoree and was inducted into their Hall of Honor. Col. Holtan holds membership in the prestigious American Bandmasters Association and serves on the Advisory Committee to the Midwest Clinic.





Dr. John R. Locke

Since 1982, Dr. John R. Locke has served on the UNCG School of Music Faculty as Director of Bands, Director of Summer Music Camps, conductor of the Wind Ensemble, and conducting teacher until his retirement in December 2018. He holds the Bachelor and Master of Music degrees from West Virginia University and the Doctor of Education degree from the University of Illinois. Previously, Dr. Locke held teaching positions in music at West Virginia University, Southeast Missouri State University, and the University of Illinois. He has conducted band performances throughout the world including National Conventions of the MENC, CBDNA, ABA, the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., the Strathmore Center in Washington, DC, Lincoln Center in New York City, Dvorak Hall in Prague, Czech Republic, Innsbruck, Austria, Bologna and Rome, Italy. Twice, the UNCG Wind Ensemble earned critical acclaim from The Washington Post newspaper following concert performances in the

nation's capital. Under Locke's leadership, the UNCG Wind Ensemble has released 21 commercially available compact discs including fireworks! which was a Grammy Entry List 2011 CD in two categories, "Classical Album of the Year" and "Best Orchestral Performance." In addition. he has guest conducted the U.S. Air Force Band, U.S. Army Field Band, U.S. Navy Band, "The President's Own" U.S. Marine Band, the Dallas Wind Symphony, as well as numerous university bands including University of Illinois, Iowa, LSU, Alabama, Florida, West Virginia, Idaho, Georgia, Nebraska - Omaha, Long Beach State, Troy, Bowling Green, South Florida, Furman, Youngstown State, Boise State, Morehead State, Eastern New Mexico, Washburn, Kennesaw State and numerous all-state honor bands and intercollegiate bands.

At UNCG, Dr. Locke is the founder of the Summer Music Camp program, now the largest university music camp in America, enrolling over 2,000 students annually and served by a staff of 170 professionals. He is also the founder of the Carolina Band Festival and Conductors Conference. Since 1977, he has administered summer music camps for over 67,000 students. He is in constant demand as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator for band festivals throughout the United States and Canada.



Thomas is an active clinician as well as a member of the Fairfax County Band Director's Association, Virginia Band and Orchestra Director's Association, National Association for Music Education, the Dr. William P. Foster Project Collaborative and the National Band Association.

Brian **Thomas**

Brian Thomas currently serves as the band director at Justice High School in Falls Church, VA where he teaches the Wind Ensemble, Symphonic Band, Concert Band, Guitar and the Marching Band, Mr. Thomas earned a Bachelor's in Music Education and Master's in Music Performance from the University of Kentucky and George Mason University. His teaching career began in 1993 as a low brass clinician, at which time he founded and directed the Burke Summer Tuba Ensemble. Since 1998 Mr. Thomas has taught band in the state of Virginia for Fairfax County Public Schools as well as Alexandria City Schools. Bands under his direction have consistently earned superior ratings at state and national assessments. The Justice Wind Ensemble has been invited to perform at the 2014, 2017 and 2020 National Concert Band Festival hosted by Music for All. The Wind Ensemble was also selected to perform at the Virginia Music Educators Conference in 2021. Additionally, Mr.





Dr. Michael Votta, Jr.

Michael Votta, Jr. has been hailed by critics as "a conductor with the drive and ability to fully relay artistic thoughts" and praised for his "interpretations of definition, precision and most importantly, unmitigated joy." Ensembles under his direction have received critical acclaim in the United States, Europe and Asia for their "exceptional spirit, verve and precision," their "sterling examples of innovative programming" and "the kind of artistry that is often thought to be the exclusive purview of top symphonic ensembles."

He currently serves as Director of Bands at the University of Maryland where he holds the rank of Professor. Under his leadership, the UM Wind Orchestra has been invited to perform at the international conference of the World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles as well as national and regional conferences of the College Band Directors National Association. UMWO has also performed with major

artists such as the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra, Eighth Blackbird, and the Imani Winds. UMWO has commissioned and premiered works by Andre Previn, Steven Mackey, Alvin Singleton, James Syler and numerous others.

Votta has taught conducting seminars in the US, Israel and Canada, and has quest conducted and lectured throughout the world with organizations including the Beijing Wind Orchestra, the Prague Conservatory, the Eastman School of Music, the Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, the National Arts Camp at Interlochen, the Midwest Clinic and the Conductors Guild.

His performances have been heard in broadcasts throughout the US, on Austrian National Radio (ÖRF), and Southwest German Television, and have been released internationally on the Primavera label. Numerous major composers including George Crumb, Christopher Rouse, Louis Andriessen, Karel Husa, Olly Wilson, Barbara Kolb, and Warren Benson have praised his performances of their works. His arrangements and editions for winds have been performed and recorded by university and professional wind ensembles in the US, Europe and Japan. He is also the author and editor of books and articles on wind literature and conducting.

He is currently Vice-President of the College Band Directors National Association and Past President of the Big Ten Band Directors Association.

Before his appointment at Maryland, Votta held conducting positions at the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill, Duke University, Ithaca College, the University of South Florida, Miami University (Ohio) and Hope College.

As a clarinetist, Votta has performed as a soloist throughout the US and Europe. His solo and chamber music recordings are available on the Partridge and Albany labels.

Thomas S. Wootton **High School**


Thomas S. Wootton High School is a public high school in Rockville, Maryland. The school was founded in 1970 and named for the founder of Montgomery County, Thomas Sprigg Wootton. Wootton High School is part of the Montgomery County Public Schools system with Robert Frost Middle School and half of Cabin John Middle School feeding into Wootton High School. The Wootton Band program offers several musical ensembles: Wind Ensemble, Symphonic Winds, Patriot Winds, Marching Band, Pit Orchestra, Indoor Guard, Indoor Percussion, and Jazz Band. The Wind Ensemble, Symphonic Winds, Patriot Winds, and Jazz Band consistently earn Superior ratings at the District Band Assessments. In addition to Wootton's Concert successes, the WHS Band program is distinguished by a high representation in the Montgomery All-County and Maryland All State Bands. Students also participate in Solo and Ensemble Performance Assessments

as well as the Maryland Classic Youth Orchestra, the Potomac Valley Youth Orchestra, and the American Youth Philharmonic. The Wootton Marchina Band is a consistent USBands competitor, winning the Group 3A Maryland State Marching Band Championship in 2017 and 2018. In 2017, the Marching Band earned 2nd place in the USBands Group 3A National Championship and in 2018, won the Group 3A National Championship. In 2019, the Marching Band moved to the Maryland Marching Band Association circuit and continued to find success.

Susan Eckerle is in her fourth year as the Thomas S. Wootton High School Director of Bands in Rockville, MD. As a spouse of a retired U.S. Naval Officer, her family moved often which meant she accepted challenging jobs that many would not even consider. Teaching in these extremely diverse school systems, (Hawaii, Mississippi (twice), and Maryland (Charles and Montgomery Counties), has given her the experience, the confidence and certainty in that all students can achieve excellence when they are afforded the opportunity.

She earned her Bachelor of Instrumental Music Education at Louisiana State University, where she studied with Mr. Frank Wickes. She earned her Master of Arts, Performance (Conducting) at California State University, Fresno, where she worked with Dr. Lawrence Sutherland and Dr. Gary Gilroy. Mrs.





W.T. Woodson **High School**

Fairfax County Public Schools is made up of nearly 200 schools and centers serving over 180,000 students making it the 10th largest school district in the United States. FCPS has a long and storied tradition of excellence in music education, especially in the band world. Groups from FCPS have performed at nearly every imaginable venue and professional development event throughout the world, including over 20 appearances at the Music for All National Festival. The 25 high schools in Fairfax County represent some of the very best band programs in the Commonwealth of Virginia and the east coast.

The W.T. Woodson High School band program has enjoyed a decorated history of success and achievement. Under its many successful directors, the bands have received consistent superior ratings at marching and concert festivals since the school's founding in 1962. The band is a 25-time Virginia Honor Band Award recipient, including the last eleven consecutive years. The band has performed four times at the National Concert Band Festival in 1992, 1995, 1999 and 2002. The band and its directors have been recognized twice by the John Philip Sousa Foundation with the Sudler Flag of Honor for excellence in concert band performance, in 1995 and 2011. The band has also performed at CBDNA/ NBA Southern Division events multiple times, as well as numerous high school

and collegiate honor clinics and festivals over the years. The Wind Ensemble was selected to play at the Virginia Music Educator's Association professional development conference five times in the last 30 years, most recently in 2018 and was a featured ensemble for the 2020 Music for All National Festival.

The band program at W.T. Woodson High School is a comprehensive program made up of over 180 students in the three large concert ensembles, percussion ensemble, two jazz bands, multiple small ensembles, winter guard and the Marching Cavaliers.

Aaron also stays active as a sought-after adjudicator and guest clinician in multiple states. West Springfield **High School**

West Springfield: The school and its community

The West Springfield community is located in the heart of Fairfax County about 14 miles outside of Washington, D.C. in the northeastern corner of Virginia. Due in large part to its proximity to the I-95 corridor, many West Springfield residents are members of the military or employed by business/professional occupations associated with the federal government. The high school itself serves almost 2,400 students and possesses a population that reflects the diversity of the Washington Metropolitan Area.

Fairfax County is home to over onemillion residents and 590,000-plus jobs and spans 407 square miles. Fairfax County Public Schools currently serves over 186,000 students through 139 elementary schools, 23 middle schools, and 27 high schools making it the largest school system in the state of Virginia and the 10th largest in the nation.

West Springfield High School is fortunate to have a relatively pure "pyramid" setup for its feeders. Irving Middle School feeds entirely into our high school. With the exception of a few students who are pupil placed through the county's Advanced Academic Placement program, most of our pyramid's elementary school students go to Irving MS and then to West Springfield HS.



Music at West Springfield High School

West Springfield is pleased and proud to be part of Fairfax County Public Schools, with its devotion to academic achievement and commitment to excellence in music education. The West Springfield Wind Symphony is comprised of fifty-five of the band program's more than 175 enrolled students, which includes three performing concert bands, jazz ensemble, marching band, color guard, and several chamber ensembles. The West Springfield Wind Symphony has performed as a featured ensemble at the Virginia Music Educators Association In-Service Conference in 2001, 2008, 2013, and 2019. The group has also performed as a Featured Band at the 2000, 2010, and 2016 Music for All National Concert Band Festival.

The band program is fortunate enough to have an extremely supportive and active band booster organization. Through our community's support through our Tag Day fundraiser and the band's concession stand sales in the fall, the band boosters provide a substantial amount of funding for supplemental instruction. Sectional

coaches are brought in to work with each ensemble once a week from September through the beginning of November and again in January and February. Each concert band class meets for 90 minutes every other day. Membership in the Marching Spartans is a co-requisite for our advanced band students (Symphonic Band and Wind Symphony) and is open to all members of our Concert Band. Aside from a few hour-long sectionals scheduled for the Wind Symphony members during concert assessment season, after school rehearsals for concert band classes are minimal. Approximately 50% percent of students in the Wind Symphony study privately.

The music department at West Springfield offers a wide range of performing ensembles and courses which include four string orchestras, one full orchestra, four choirs, six sections of guitar, and AP Music Theory. In total, the music department serves nearly 600 students at West Springfield. The WSHS Chamber Orchestra has performed as a featured ensemble at the 2005 and 2015 VMEA In-Service Conference, and West Springfield has been named a VMEA Blue Ribbon School of Excellence for the past seven straight years and fourteen years in total. The WSHS Madrigals were a featured choir at the 2017 VMEA In-Service Conference. We are proud of the level of collaboration and excellence that has been established between our programs and are committed to the success of all our music programs.


